The Measles Mumps and Rubella vaccine has had some bad press recently. You may have seen in the news that 2 children in Samoa tragically died after receiving the vaccine. This kind of news is always concerning to the people who vaccinate children. We are people who like to help others, and are usually working to protect and heal. Two nurses have since been charged over the deaths and although there is no further information about what happened, it is obvious that it was not the vaccine at fault, but more likely human error. This hard working little vaccine saves millions of children's lives across the world every year, including our own tamariki. Despite this, we still have outbreaks. We are on the tail end of a mumps outbreak at the moment. If your child has missed an MMR immunisation, be aware that they may be at risk. Prevention is so much easier than cure. Be wise, immunise.
