What Is a Hāngi?

Hāngi is a traditional Māori style of cooking that has been used for hundreds of years, and it is still used throughout New Zealand today.

It is a special way of cooking food under the ground using red hot rocks and steam. A similar style of cooking can be found all around the Pacific, like the Umu in Samoa.

The Hangi is usually used for pork, chicken, kumara, potato, pumpkin, and other vegetables such as carrots, peas and watercress.

How a Hangi Is Made

First, a pit big enough for all the food is dug, then a fire is made at the bottom of the pit. It is best to use hard wood for the fire, such as macrocarpa, because it is easy to find, gives off a lot of heat and it burns for a long time. Next, rocks are piled on top of the wood; volcanic rocks are best because they can absorb a lot of heat; non-volcanic rocks will crack and explode. Once the fire has burnt out, the rocks are white hot. Food is then placed

in the hāngi - meat at the bottom and vegetables on top. The food is covered with wet cloths and dirt. The water in the wet cloths turns into steam when it gets heated by the hot rocks. As the steam can't escape through the dirt, it heats and cooks the food. The food is left to cook for at least 3 hours - it is then uncovered and served as a meal.

History of the Hāngi

The hāngi was very spiritual, Māori only took as much food from the land or the sea as was needed. The food they hunted and gathered was seen as 'gifts' from Tangaroa - the god of the sea, and Tānemahuta - the god of the forest.

Māori tradition was that if anybody walked over the hāngi while the food was inside cooking, the food was seen as spoiled and was uneatable.

Māori also believed that if a hāngi meal was not cooked properly, then it was disgraceful and brought shame to the community. It also meant that a disaster was likely to happen.

In thermal areas of New Zealand, the early Māori used the natural hot pools and steam from the land to cook their food.

Moa and seals were commonly cooked in hangi, along with foods such as fern-root, bulrush, pigeon, tui and parrot. Once there were not many moa or seals left, meat such as pork, mutton, chicken, fish and shellfish were used. Potatoes, kumara, pumpkin, cabbage and other tree roots and vegetables were also cooked.




