Newsletter # 12 – Thursday 9 August 2018:

A great start to Term 3 2018:

We are receiving regular compliments about the improvements to our student's behaviour and what a joy to work with they are!

Our kaiako are working extremely hard and developing our students into amazing citizens.

To assist the development of school programmes and to build kaiako knowledge and skills, we have a large number of Writing and Mathematics Facilitators, Resource Teachers of Learning and Behaviour plus many educationalists and Support Agencies Staff through our school during a normal week.

They are all so enthusiastic about the changes they see in the tamariki and how they so enjoy working with our teachers who are so receptive to new learning, strategies and techniques to progress our students learning.

What makes me most proud is the large number of students who are beginning to really engage in their learning and want to learn.

Progress after 6 months at school

We have much progress to make to ensure our students are attaining levels in the curriculum equal to that of their age.

In our first newsletter of the term I informed our community that 42% of our students are now at their Age Equivalent Level in Reading.

In the first half of the year, 62% of students made at least 6 months progress in that time, some even more progress.

Our mathematics is lagging as students learn several new strategies to solve equations such as 25 + 16.

Most of our students just 'count 16 on from 25' to get an answer.

In the New Zealand Curriculum, students must be able to solve maths problems in several ways. So in the example above, a student might take 5 from 16 to make a 'tidy 30' and simply add on the remaining 11 to provide the answer of 41.

We see our writing achievements beginning to progress as well, but again, students need to write very explicitly not just show capital letters, full stops and correct spelling.

It has been spelling that the teachers have been concentrating upon in their classes in the first half of the year.

In NZ we have The Essential Lists (1-8) that all students must know to write. This is nearly 300 words. Our Mid Term Data indicates that over 70% of our students know how to spell the Essential Words for their age level. We have a lot of work to do, but this is a very positive start.

Strike Action: Wednesday 15 August 2018:

I am sad to report Pukekohe North School will close on Wednesday 15 August for the day to allow Teachers to voice their concern to Government in the strongest terms about our conditions of work. This is a nationwide Day of Strike action including marches in cities and towns, visits to Parliament and letter writing to local Ministers.

It is not only about a pay increase! Whilst like all workers, teachers want their salaries to keep up with pace of inflation and to be paid appropriately for the work we do, we have other concerns for the Government to review and address: These include:

- There is a teacher shortage meaning often classes across Aotearoa must to be 'split across the school' when a teacher is sick or on Professional Development leave.
- Our teacher work force is aging and the sector is not adequately encouraging young people into our work force then retaining them in schools
- Class sizes are becoming too high (National agrees and state they will increase the number of teachers in schools, but we need to attract teachers to cover the present vacancies BEFORE we can add MORE staff into schools)
- > Students across the motu are becoming more difficulty to teach. Staff at Early Childhood Centres record they are dealing with traumatised 3-4 year olds! We need the resourcing and expertise to support these young learners.
- These students add to an already full workload where teachers are regularly working 60+ hours per week for the 40 hours we are being paid.
- Expectations on teachers are high to solve the socio-economic problems of society. We must be better resourced to support students with health and well-being issues to make them feel safe and secure before we can actually improve their learning and make sound progress in their Literacy and Numeracy.

We want the Government to provide solutions and plans to assist our tamariki. We are at crisis point and providing a 3-4% pay increase will not simply assist the situation.

Pukekohe North School will open again on Thursday 16 August as usual.

Supporting Nga Hau E Wha Marae:

You would all have heard of the theft of taps and copper piping from Nga Hau E Wha last week. This has upset everyone and Pukekohe Schools want to provide our support by holding a Mufti Day on Friday 17 August.

We are asking whanau to provide a Gold Coin donation for the Mufti Day with all monies raised from our schools to be presented to the Marae Committee to use as they see fit.

Cross Country

Whaea Sally has been working hard to organise our school Cross Country to be held on Tuesday 14 August from 11.20.a.m.-12.50.p.m. around the school and local street.

Sally has set aside Thursday 16 August as her saving day if it is raining on the 14th! She has requested that students run the cross country in spare clothes in case they do get dirty or wet.

We look forward to seeing you at school to support the runners next week.

Message from our Public Health Nurse-Sara White



We are all addicted to food. You have to eat to live, and we are hard-wired to like sugar and fat, so it's no wonder most of us are overweight. Children process some foods differently to adults, so what we put into their bodies can have a bigger impact (good or bad). For example, they take longer to process caffeine. We don't usually offer kids coffee, but we let them have coke (which is loaded with the stuff). Let's be honest, most breakfast cereals are simply crunchy sugar. Fresh whole food is awesome for growing good bodies and brains. Small changes can make a big

difference. How about just swapping Coke for Sprite? Or rolled oats (raw or as porridge) for that crunchy sugar? You might even end up saving money too.
