The BOT met on Saturday and appointed two new staff members for Pukekohe North School.

We had a strong field to choose from and are proud to announce that Sarah Poutai will commence duties as our Deputy Principal as of February 2019.

You will be aware that Sarah teaches at Pukekohe Intermediate at present setting up an Interactive Learning Environment and Digital Learning base in the Batten Team.

Sarah comes to us with expertise in Sports, Kapahaka and leadership roles in in Literacy, Mathematics and Maori Curriculum.

Sarah will teach in the Middle School from 2019.

The Board also appointed a Leader for the Kura Rumaki; Henare King.

Henare is presently a Senior Lecturer in Education (Practicum Based Learning at Te Wananga o Aotearoa)

Henare has established skills in building Maori Curriculum and developing teachers.

He is very musical and has coached Kapahaka teams to regional competition levels.

Henare, like Sarah, has a passion for Maori Education and students succeeding.

He is a fluent speaker of Te Reo Maori.

Henare will join us from Tuesday 16 October 2018 and commence his work with the Kura Rumaki throughout Term 4 and thus gains a great vantage point to launch his programming from 2019.

the water. I could feel the cool water on my face as I jumped in. It felt refreshing. My skin felt shiny and silky as I sat amongst the boulders. This is paradise.


